Andrew Mitchell - through the eventful graph of his experiences starting from the Royal Tank Regiment days to the high walls of the British Parliament as an MP at 31 only – has showed the world what magic we can witness when commitment for the people mix and match with political will and authority.

Andrew was born in 1956 and is married with two daughters. He was educated at Rugby School and Cambridge University, where he studied history and was elected as President of the Cambridge Union in 1978. Andrew served in the Army (Royal Tank Regiment) before joining Lazard where he worked with British companies seeking large-scale overseas contracts.

He was the Member of Parliament for Gedling from 1987 to 1997. During this period he held office as a Government Whip and as Minister for Social Security. He also served as a Vice-Chairman of the Conservative Party from 1992 to 1993.

In 2001 he was re-elected to Parliament as MP for Sutton Coldfield. In November 2003, he was appointed Shadow Minister for Economic Affairs. From September 2004 until the end of the Parliamentary term, he was Shadow Minister for Home Affairs. Following the General Election in May 2005 Andrew joined the



Shadow Secretary of State for International Development. Andrew Mitchell was Secretary of State for International Development from May 2010 until September 2012 and Government Chief Whip from September - October 2012. An experienced and highly effective MP, Andrew is committed to serving the people of Sutton Coldfield.

"Project Umubano" (its name taken from the Rwandan word for 'friendship'), the Conservative Party's social action programme, now in its tenth Shadow Cabinet and was appointed year, is championing international

development, post-conflict reconciliation and poverty reduction through its projects in Rwanda, Sierra Leone and Burundi. Andrew was later appointed Secretary of State for International Development and is credited for challenging and changing attitudes towards international development within the Conservative Party and building a body of advocates for it, inside and outside Parliament. As Secretary of State for International Development, he travelled extensively all around the globe to address every crisis - manmade or natural. Andrew is responsible for securing ring-fenced spends of 0.7% of GDP on international development, which has funded ID projects across the developing world.
