The programme helps children and adolescents struggling to come to terms with their HIV status by providing a fun, friendly and safe environment for them to address their men-



tal health and wellbeing amongst their peers, giving them the tools and knowledge they need to lead long, healthy and productive lives. It ensures children's basic needs are met including food, shelter, education, healthcare and love. It also provides specialist care such as psychosocial support and aid for those with disabilities. It also delivers life skills and vocational training to enable children to return to their community and support themselves through life. Another

incredible initiative on behalf of the foundation is the 'Let Youth Lead' advocacy programme - which provides young people with a platform to voice the challenges of youth living with HIV and those affected by the epidemic in sub-Saharan Africa. The programme aims to engage policymakers to drive positive change in HIV interventions that better support this generation. It also provides adolescent-friendly HIV Testing & Counseling Services (HTS) and HIV prevention services in Lesotho, with young people (18 to 24 year olds) at the heart of delivering this work. These young people are called 'Peer Educators'.
